SHELTER WA OBJECTIVES

The objectives of Shelter WA are to:

- Promote appropriate, accessible, affordable and secure housing for all West Australians, particularly focusing on low income and disadvantaged West Australians;
- Undertake or sponsor research and provide education directed towards affordable housing related issues, the elimination of homelessness and housing related poverty;
- Participate in the development of national, state and local Government housing policies to
 promote an increase in the supply of secure, appropriate and affordable housing, including an
 expanded and improved affordable housing sector which is accessible to all, especially those
 who are disadvantaged;
- Promote the involvement of consumers facing housing difficulties in the formulation of national, state and local Government housing policies and develop networks to facilitate this process;
- Support and promote initiatives which increase the capacity of individuals and groups to attain secure, appropriate and affordable housing of their choice, including providing a referral service free of charge;
- Provide education to housing workers and consumers and the general public on housing and housing related issues, and in particular the publication, promotion and circulation of reports, periodicals and other documents for the furtherance of these objects;
- Explore opportunities to strengthen Shelter WA's response to the need for a greater supply of affordable housing for low income and otherwise disadvantaged consumers; and
- Engage key stakeholders, relevant departments and work with other community organisations to further these objectives and influence housing policy decision makers.

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

Shelter WA has had an excellent year and continued to work tirelessly in 2010-2011 to promote affordable housing options for those most vulnerable in our community. Its policy submissions, research and public forums have enhanced public information and awareness about affordable housing and homelessness in WA. Shelter WA works closely with other community organisations to contribute to the development of the affordable housing sector and inform policy debates. We look forward to continuing this work across the sector in the coming year.

The 2010/11 year saw a great deal of national and international turmoil, with natural disasters, global credit crunch and political upheaval causing a great deal of uncertainty and suffering. The impact on housing was a fall in the value of residential real estate, a reduction in the number of private housing starts and the associated decrease in the supply of new housing. With annual housing demand constantly outstripping housing supply, especially in the affordable sector of the market, housing stress is continuing to rise.

The state government and federal government, championed by the Department of Housing have been instrumental in providing an increased supply of affordable housing into the market in the last three years. The challenge for the respective governments is to maintain that momentum in a difficult economic environment and with very slow global growth.

The state of Western Australia is extremely well placed from an international and national perspective due to its expanding economy. The state and the department of housing are enabling an improving continuum of housing affordability for Western Australians. Shelter WA is providing support to promote that housing affordability and that all Western Australians have secure housing.

Throughout the year, Shelter WA continued to work with National Shelter on a variety of projects. Vice Chair Tammy Solonec had the opportunity to attend the National Shelter Indigenous Housing Roundtable held in July 2011. This was followed by a second meeting of the Indigenous Housing Roundtable in May 2011 where it was agreed that National Shelter would seek funding to support facilitating regular meetings. Shelter WA continues to work with National Shelter to develop this and other projects.

Thank you to the members of Shelter WA, who are crucial to the success of the organisation. Bronwyn Kitching resigned from the Executive Officer role in August 2011 and we would like to acknowledge her contribution and wish her well in her future endeavours. This year has seen our most stable and best ever staff contingent at Shelter WA with Dr Shae Garwood, Stephanie Bachman and Corinne Mercer providing outstanding commitment and tireless effort to ensure Shelter WA is running at optimum performance. We are currently interviewing some inspiring individuals for the Executive Officer position to lead Shelter WA into a bright future. Our team aim to ensure that the voice of our low income, homeless and otherwise disadvantage people in Perth are heard at all levels of Government and other groups associated with finding affordable housing options.

Shelter WA is promoting, researching, educating, and engaging with all levels of government and housing consumers to increase the supply of affordable housing. We are in the process of reengineering the constitution, policies and procedures, strategic direction, management and performance of Shelter WA to constantly improve and update our service delivery for the people of Western Australia.

I would like to sincerely acknowledge and thank the ongoing support of the Department of Housing. The Department has consistently supported Shelter WA's work to promote affordable housing in the state. We are particularly keen to work with the Department to support the implementation of the State Affordable Housing Strategy.

The former and present management committee has been truly brilliant and with the numerous sub-committee's have produced excellent results with constitutional, organisational and strategic direction. My sincere and heartfelt thanks to Tammy Solonec (Vice-Chair), David McKlnley (Treasurer), Cindy Dunham (acting Vice Chair), Dr Antoinette Morris, Bev Carstairs and Juanita Baron. We also acknowledge the superb efforts of long serving committee members who I would warmly like to thank John Perrett (treasurer), Liz Kerry, Kerry Morgan, and Paul Harrison, and also thank committee members Nghia Luong, Jim Petrie and Jenny Begent.

AGENCY REPORT

The financial year July 2010 through June 2011 was another very full year for Shelter WA. Shelter's contribution to housing policy review, development and evaluation saw us participating in many committees, networks and government consultations. We maintained our regular communications to members and subscribers, delivering monthly email updates, quarterly newsletters and conducting a number of information and consultation workshops, forums and conference presentations.

The 2010/11 financial year saw ongoing implementation of Commonwealth and State funding and program initiatives introduced in 2008 with the National Affordable Housing Agreement and the complementary National Partnership Agreements on Social Housing and Homelessness, together delivering the largest boost to affordable housing construction and housing support service provision WA has seen in several decades. New and expanded homeless services were operational from July 2010. Shelter WA welcomes this renewed focus on the multifaceted dynamics of homelessness and the barriers faced by people who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.

Three key aspects in the Western Australian housing system were progressed over the past year. First, the Minister for Housing achieved cabinet endorsement for a State Affordable Housing Strategy, Opening Doors, which was launched in May 2011. Shelter WA welcomes the strategy as a bold step towards broadening the scope of the Department of Housing beyond the provision of housing to supporting the growth and development of affordable housing, public private partnerships, and recognizing that a diversity of policy responses are needed to meet the diverse needs of low and moderate income West

Australians. Shelter WA looks forward to working closely with the Department of Housing to implement the aims set out in the Affordable Housing Strategy. Second, *Directions 2031* sought public input to review West Australian planning laws in order to facilitate a more diverse residential built form that encourages well-located urban in-fill construction, increase in residential density and the construction of smaller, more affordable dwellings.

The third key aspect was the introduction to Parliament of proposed amendments to the 1987 WA Residential Tenancies Act (RTA). The community sector has been urging the government to review the RTA for over 20 years. A consortium of community sector agencies, along with Shelter WA, are encouraging state politicians to reconsider some of the amendments which would allow the eviction of tenants deemed to be engaged in disruptive behavior. This is particularly troubling for people with mental illnesses, who may be disproportionately affected by such policies, and who are at risk of becoming homeless if evicted.

Shelter WA continued its systemic advocacy, research and policy submissions throughout the year. In March, we published the State of Affordable Housing report. The report provides a comprehensive look at affordable housing and homelessness in WA. In addition to being a useful tool for those in the affordable housing sector, it has been accessed by policy makers, journalists and the private sector. Earlier in the year, we held forums on the planning and economics of affordable housing, including one forum aimed at local councils. This forum provided Shelter WA an opportunity to dialogue with local councilors about the challenges they face in their communities and

the ways in which local councils can promote more affordable living for those most in need.

We continued to expand and develop Shelter's Community Engagement Strategy. The strategy aims to improve our links with the community and in particular housing consumers. As part of that strategy, we held two forums on Renting in WA which provided us with the opportunity to meet with a wide cross section of renters in WA to hear their stories. Also as part of our Community Engagement Strategy, we reached out to consumers to hear about which housing issues were most important to them. On one visit, we were welcomed warmly at the Lorikeet Centre. We met with its members who are affected by mental illness. They spoke openly with us and we really appreciated their honesty especially sharina their experiences homelessness with us. Staff have enjoyed working towards a greater involvement with the sector and housing consumers and look forward to visiting more agencies, members and the community in the next year.

As part of our peak role Shelter has continued to engage with local community organisations to promote affordable housing and to highlight the issues impacting housing consumers. This includes coordinating the Boarders and Lodgers Working Group with Tenants Advice Service WA (TAS) and convening the NGO Housing Alliance with the Community Housing Coalition of WA and TAS earlier in the year.

In addition to the activities and committees highlighted throughout the body of this document, Shelter WA contributed to State and National consultations and policy considerations, presented papers to conferences, and continued to respond to members of the community seeking assistance and information regarding their housing needs.

We sincerely thank the Shelter WA members and the Management Committee for their engagement and dedication over 2010/11.

Finally, we must gratefully acknowledge the Department of Housing WA for its unbroken support to Shelter WA since 1979.

ACTIVITY REPORT

Shelter WA receives its core funding from the WA Department of Housing. Our service agreement with the Department of Housing requires Shelter WA to provide the following services:

- Conduct research and publish papers on housing issues relevant and current to Western Australia.
- Produce, disseminate and distribute information to the community sector and housing consumers on housing issues.
- Support members of the community sector to work together to achieve positive housing outcomes for low income housing consumers.
- Advise the Department on social housing policy positions which reflect and are informed by Shelter WA's constituency.
- Invite and initiate customer input into the Department's policies and practices.
- Coordinate community sector input to the Department's housing advisory committees.
- Convene community consultation on housing issues.

The 2010/11 Contract Management Plan focused Shelter WA's activities on three key areas:

- 1. Support the community sector in voicing input on housing issues to the Government and its appointed representatives, including research and preparation of discussion papers.
- 2. Community consultation on housing issues, including conducting housing forums and surveys.
- 3. Produce and distribute information to the community sector through regular newsletters, email updates and a website.

Social impact of the high cost of housing

There are many pathways into homeless. Johnson et al (2008) classify five typical pathways including domestic violence, mental health, substance use, people who have experienced homelessness before turning 18 years old, and housing crisis. The housing crisis pathway is often the end result of a critical incident occurring, such as a sudden severe illness, loss of a job, relationship breakdown or divorce, or an unexpected event such as a flood or fire, overlaid on an existing financially precarious situation. As housing prices increase across Australia, or at least remain at unsustainably high levels, we are bound to see an increase in the number of people who become homeless through the housing crisis pathway.


Housing stress is often defined as households paying more than 30% of their income on housing or accommodation costs. Measuring housing stress is a useful tool to gauge the number of households living one event away from becoming

homeless. All it takes is one event such as an illness, loss of a job, family breakdown, or divorce, on top of other financial problems to send a family who is housed and living under housing stress into homelessness. Johnson et al (2008) note that people entering homelessness due to housing crisis often experience a series of ongoing financial problems which have a compounding effect. This is particularly so for low income households unable to accrue any savings due to high housing costs.

Shelter WA is in the process of conducting a survey to learn more about peoples' concerns about housing, how housing affects their wellbeing, and their thoughts on the role of government in promoting housing affordability. Of the 97 respondents so far, over 25% were homeless, live in temporary accommodation, were staying with friends or family, or were in need of accommodation. Forty percent (40%) rent from a private landlord or real estate agent, 13% live in public housing, 3% in community housing, and 18% were home owners.

When asked what they were most concerned about, 77% identified the high cost of housing in WA, 71% cited a shortage of rental properties, and 69% said they were concerned about long waiting lists for public housing and community housing. Other comments included lack of diversity in housing types (30%), shortage of affordable homes for purchase (52%), discrimination in accessing housing (37%) and inadequate rental assistance for households on Centrelink benefits (45%). One person asked, "Why isn't there more small, accessible, cheaper places for single people to buy?"

Many respondents cited adverse effects to their health and well-being as a result of high housing costs. Eighty-seven percent (87%) said that they had experienced stress or anxiety and 43% cited other physical or mental health issues. Thirty-seven percent (37%) of respondents experienced homelessness as a result of high housing costs. Forty-eight (48%) had to relocate to cheaper accommodation or share housing. Sixty-eight percent (68%) of respondents had to cut back on basic necessities including food, clothing, education or healthcare. The graph below shows the distribution of survey participants' responses.



The survey also aimed to gauge people's support for government policies and programs that could promote affordable housing. Seventy-four percent (74%) of respondents support building more public housing, 64% support requiring new developments to include at least 15% affordable dwellings, 67% support restricting rent increases, and 62% want more tenancy support to help people stay in their homes. Other people suggested more rent to own schemes and using money from a mining tax to assist people less fortunate to have a place to live.

The respondents' comments below convey the depth of their concerns about housing stress and the risk of becoming homeless.

"I will worry about my housing for the rest of my life - I rent and therefore have no security."

"Currently, I am living in a dangerous situation without options or choices...I am scared constantly...what can I do?"

"I go without food and also my daughter is hungry most of the time... I make sure I give her what I can but I feel bad."

"I am getting older and with my current medical conditions, I simply worry about the future."

These respondents have experienced different housing pathways. What they share in common is financial housing stress, which has contributed to emotional stress and fear for their future well-being. For some of them, this stress has contributed to homelessness. For others, they remain housed, but live precariously close to the line between being housed and becoming homeless.

The survey did not aim to measure the impact of housing stress in relation to other factors causing homelessness. Nevertheless, the preliminary results provide an indicator of how people feel about their housing and how high housing costs are influencing other aspects of their lives. The findings are troubling, as high housing costs in WA have contributed to people cutting back on food and other necessities, experiencing stress and anxiety, and for some, becoming homeless or helping friends and family who have become homeless. While addressing the high cost of housing will not eliminate homelessness, it will help keep people in their homes and limit the effect of housing stress as an underlying precursor to the housing crisis pathway into homelessness.

National Shelter continued working with the Summit Group, ACOSS, the Community Housing Federation of Australia, and the National Association of Tenant Organisations. National Shelter completed four work projects funded by FaHCSIA – and began to progress COHA - 'Community Organisations Housing Alliance', bringing together the Australian Council of Trade Unions, ACOSS, the Community Housing Federation and Homelessness Australia.

SURVEYS

Shelter WA's enhanced research capacity has enabled us to design and implement a number of surveys over the past year. These surveys have strengthened our consumer participation and strengthened our submissions and consultation responses. We conducted three surveys this year on Indigenous homeownership, affordable housing, and renting in WA. The survey on Indigenous homeownership informed our submission on Aboriginal homeownership to FAHCSIA. Findings from the affordable housing survey were disseminated to the sector in the article in *Parity* and *Housing Works*, described above.

FORUMS, PRESENTATIONS AND CONSUMER ENGAGEMENT

Shelter WA hosted the following events:

Renting in WA, 10 May 2011 North Metro (Mirrabooka) and 25 May 2011 South Metro (Queens Park)

In May 2011 Shelter WA ran two forums (one each in the South and North metropolitan areas of Perth). The forums entitled *Renting in WA* were organised as a response to the large number of calls Shelter receives regarding private rentals and the issues raised by various community organisations, individuals and services.

The aim of the forums was to garner feedback from individuals and the community regarding their experiences of renting in WA. The forums where attended by 21 people from a cross-section of the community and included families (many from CALD backgrounds), individuals, a local MP, and housing service providers.

The issues raised by the attendees included:

- Lack of affordable properties for rent
- High cost of private rental housing
- Excessive rent increases
- Unfair landlords
- Long waiting lists for community and public housing
- Discrimination in accessing housing. For example, one participant said, "because I have children and I'm black...[the agent assumes that] I can't take care of their house"
- Evictions
- Homelessness

Several participants indicated that they had high levels of stress and had gone without food and other essentials to keep a roof over their heads. Shelter WA thanks all those who attended and shared their stories and experiences.



Housing Economics and Planning: Local responses to the need for affordable housing 20 October 2010 for local councils and 18 November 2010 for the affordable housing sector

At these forums, we explored planning tools designed to deliver a vibrant, diverse and affordable housing market. This will be an interactive workshop, designed to draw out specific issues of interest to participants and generate ideas about responding to the housing needs of today's households, planning for the housing needs of the future and supporting local communities and businesses. Forty-nine (49) people attended the local council forum and 27 people attended the public forum.

Affordable Housing Alliance NGO Forum, 12 October 2010

Shelter WA hosted this forum with the Community Housing Coalition of WA and the Tenants Advice Service. It explored the communication and consultation strategies and mechanisms currently in place for NGO organisations to be informed of and contribute to housing policy evaluation and development. Thirty-two (32) NGO representatives attended the forum.

Sustainable Population Australia AGM, 29 August 2010

Bronwyn Kitching addressed the Annual General Meeting of Sustainable Population Australia (WA Branch). This group has become increasingly concerned with the environmental and social impacts of Australian population growth, and migration and sought an informed presentation about the Australian housing system and housing circumstances, with a focus on sustainability.

Boarding and Lodging Houses and Housing Indicators International Tenancy Day, 4 October 2010

The Tenants Advice Service (WA) coordinated and hosted this half day forum at Curtin University exploring Boarding and Lodging House tenancy issues with a focus on the lack of protection in this tenure and the impact on international students. The Forum was attended by 52 participants from a wide range of government and community organisations and interested individuals and was very well received.

Design Build Expo Conference Panel, 3 November 2010

Bronwyn Kitching participated in a panel for this event. The presentation addressed housing design, diversity, size and overconsumption relative to changing social demographics in aspects such as shrinking family size, the ageing population, household mobility and cultural aspirations.

Shelter WA had a stable year financially with two new part time roles of Research Officer and a Community Development and Policy Officer, augmenting the previous position of Research Manager.

This new organisational position increased Shelter WA's capacity, performance and outputs. However it increased Shelter WA's salaries which combined with provision for annual leave and long service leave due to the length of service of Shelter WA's staff.

At the end of the financial year Shelter WA had a cash loss of -\$47,383.08 and all employees leave entitlements have been recognised in the Balance Sheet as a liability. All accounts have been brought to account and I have no knowledge of any outstanding or pending expenses.

Shelter WA's balance sheet for the 2010-2011 has a positive total equity position of \$40,191.51. The organisation is in a positive financial position and is in a healthy position for the coming 2011-2012 financial year.

All accounts have been fully audited by Peter Edwards & Associates Pty and the report is attached.

I extend my appreciation to the Shelter WA staff for the successful management of the operation.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE ACCOUNTS For the year ended 30 June 2011.

NOTE 1.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The significant policies which have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are:

a) BASIS OF PREPARATION.

The accounts of the association have been drawn up in accordance with the applicable Accounting Concepts, Accounting Standards and disclosure requirements of the Australian Accounting bodies, applicable Accounting Standards, and the requirements of law. They have been prepared on the basis of historical costs and do not take into account changing money values nor, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. The accounting policies have been consistently applied.

b) INCOME TAX

The association is a "Not for Profit" organisation and is not subject to income tax on the Member income.

c) FIXED ASSETS

Items of property, plant and equipment are recorded at cost and depreciated as outlined below:

Depreciation of Fixed Assets.

Depreciation is provided on all fixed assets excluding freehold land and buildings, so as to write off each asset over its estimated useful life. The depreciation rates used are those allowable for income tax purposes.

d) INVENTORY

The association carries no 'inventoried' items.

e) EMPLOYEE ENTITLEMENTS

Amounts that are expected to be paid to employees for their pro-rata entitlements to Annual Leave, Long Service Leave and Redundancy Payments are accrued at current salary rates.
