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## EASE NOTE

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Affordable Housing as a Key Component of Sustainable Neighbourhoods

Shelter WA welcomes the opportunity to provide a submission to the Liveable Neighbourhoods Review 2015. As the peak body for social and affordable housing in Western Australia, Shelter WA understands the importance of sustainable design within the Perth metropolitan and Peel regions, and major regional centres in Western Australia.

Shelter WA supports many of the revisions made in the Liveable Neighbourhoods Review 2015. The changes made to clarify its objectives and requirements will improve ease of understanding and implementation for planners and developers.

While Liveable Neighbourhoods provides comprehensive design provisions for the establishment of safe, sustainable and compact communities featuring diversity in housing format, the goal of affordable housing provision is not included as a formal consideration. Affordable housing can be defined as housing which requires less than 30% of a household's income for households in the lowest 40% of income distribution. This is known as the 30/40 rule. Low income households are considered to be in 'housing stress' if they are paying more than 30% of their income on housing.

Affordable housing is required in each local government area in order to prevent unsustainable urban sprawl with low to moderate income earners located on the urban fringe, where house prices tend to be lower than inner ring suburbs but often result in higher transportation costs. Affordable housing is essential to achieving the objectives of Liveable Neighbourhoods. The provision of affordable housing is vital for the formation of diverse, inclusive communities that are self-sufficient whereby travelling distance between work, amenities and home is kept to a minimum in order to reduce car dependency and traffic congestion.

To support the goals of Liveable Neighbourhoods in facilitating inclusive sustainable neighbourhoods, Shelter WA recommends Liveable Neighbourhoods include further revisions to:

- 1. Ensure the need for 'affordable housing' is recognised and addressed throughout the document as a principle objective;
- 2. Revise principle Objective 7 to 'Facilitate housing diversity and affordability, responsive built form, local employment and amenity within a coherent and efficient urban structure of compact walkable neighbourhoods'; and
- 3. Revise Design principle 6 to 'Provide housing density, diversity and affordability to meet changing community needs' and include the benefits of affordable housing throughout principle 6.

With these changes, the Liveable Neighbourhoods Review 2015 will strengthen the ability of the planning system to encourage urban consolidation, community and economic development, health and welfare, and overall liveability and affordability in significant greenfield and infill developments in Western Australia.
