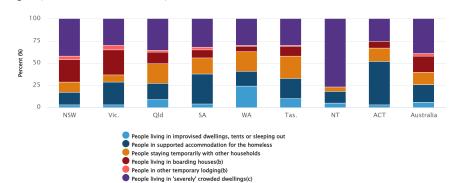
Homelessness in Western Australia

Homelessness

- 8 per cent increase in the number of people experiencing homelessness in WA, up by 724 people
- The rate of homelessness in Western Australia has also slightly increased, from 36.4 per 10,000 people in 2016 to 36.6 per 10,000 people in 2021
- WA was only one of four states or territories where the rate of homelessness increased between 2016 and 2021 (VIC, SA, WA, TAS). Despite this, WA has the lowest rate of homelessness in Australia
- The overall rate of homelessness in Australia slightly decreased from 49.8 per 10,000 people in 2016 to 48 per 10,0000 in 2021

Types of homelessness

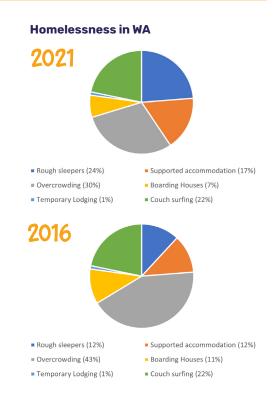
People experiencing homelessness by homeless operational groups(a), state and territory, 2021

Rough sleeping

- More than double the number of people sleeping rough from 1,083 in 2016 to 2,315 in 2021
- WA has the highest proportion of rough sleeping in Australia
- 23.8 per cent almost a quarter of the total homelessness population in WA are rough sleepers
- 6.2 per cent is the Australian average proportion of people rough sleeping, down from 7 per cent in 2016

Homelessness in Western Australia

Other types of homelessness

- 24.2 per cent decrease in severe overcrowding in WA, dropping from 3,871 in 2016 to 2,935 in 2021
- 8.9 per cent increase in couch surfing from 1,950 in 2016 to 2,125 in 2021²
- **53.1 per cent increase** in the number of people staying in **supported accommodation for the homeless** from 1,054 in 2016 to 1,614 in 2021
- 109.8 per cent increase in the number of people staying in temporary lodging from 51 in 2016 to 107 in 2021
- 36.3 per cent decrease in the number of people staying in boarding houses from 991 in 2016 to 631 in 2021

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander (ATSI) homelessness

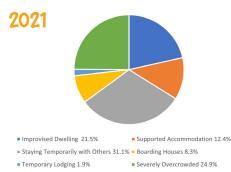
- 29 per cent increase in ATSI people experiencing homelessness from 2,618 in 2016 to 3,378 in 2021
- WA has the second highest rate of ATSI homelessness in Australia, at 381 per 10,000 people
- ATSI people account for 35 per cent of all homeless in WA, despite being 3.3 per cent of the population
- 5.8 per cent decrease in the number of people experiencing homelessness who do not identify as ATSI
- The number of people who **did not state their ATSI identity increased** from 585 in 2016 to 904 in 2021

 This effectively means the rise in homelessness in WA between 2016 and 2021 reflects an increase in ATSI homelessness
- 60.7 per cent of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people experiencing homelessness can be found outside
 of the Greater Perth area, compared to 31 per cent of non-Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people
 experiencing homelessness

Homelessness in Western Australia

Young people and children _____

- 1,927 young people experiencing homelessness between 2016 and 2021
- 19.8 per cent of the homeless population in WA are young people, below the Australian average of 23 per cent
- 2.3 per cent increase in the number of children experiencing homelessness from 1,949 in 2016 to 1,994 in 2021
- 20.5 per cent of the homeless population in WA are children under 18, below the Australian average of 23.6
 per cent

Older Persons 55+

- 23.7 per cent increase in the number of older people experiencing homelessness from 1,500 in 2016 to 1,855 in 2021
- 19.1 per cent of the homeless population in WA are older people, higher than the Australian average of 15.8 per cent

Gender

- 2.2 per cent increase in the number of men experiencing homelessness in WA from 5,226 in 2016 to 5,339 in 2021
- 54.9 per cent of the homeless population in WA are men
- **16.2 per cent increase** in the number of **women experiencing homelessness in WA** from 3,778 in 2016 to 4,389 in 2021
- 45 per cent of the homeless population in WA are women, an increase of 3 per cent on 2016

Disability 3_

- 46.8 per cent increase in the number of people experiencing homelessness who need assistance with core activities, from 333 in 2016 to 489 in 2021
- 5 per cent of all people experiencing homelessness need assistance with core activities

³ Disability in this instance is limited to "people needing assistance with core activities" in line with the data currently available from the ABS. This figure does not represent the total number of all people with disabilities experiencing homelessness.
